



# Statistics from the Northern Ireland Drug Addicts Index 2012

This statistical bulletin summarises information on all those persons registered on the Northern Ireland Drug Addicts Index at 31 December 2012 in concurrence with the Misuse of Drugs (Notification of and Supply to Addicts) (Northern Ireland) Regulations 1973. It also contains information on those added to, or removed from, the Addicts Index during 2012. It has been produced from the Addicts Index Database by the Public Health Information & Research Branch (PHIRB) on behalf of the Department of Health, Social Services and Public Safety.

## **Summary**

In Northern Ireland during 2012:

- There were 226 persons registered on the Addicts Index at 31 December 2012, a decrease of 46 from 272 persons registered at 31 December 2011.
- There were 203 renotifications in 2012, compared with 240 in 2011. There were 23 new notifications to the Addicts Index in 2012. Fifty-six cases were removed from the Addicts Index during 2012 for various reasons including 'death', 'addiction ceased', 'not resident in Northern Ireland' or 'whereabouts unknown'.
- In 2012, 76% of addicts were male, in comparison with 79% of addicts in 2011. The age profile was similar in 2011 and 2012, with the only difference being that in 2012 23% of registered addicts were aged 29 years and under compared with 26% in 2011.
- Heroin was the most frequently used notifiable drug, reported by 83% of all addicts registered at 31 December 2012. Methadone (19%) and cocaine (7%) remained the next most commonly reported drugs.
- In 2012, 57% of registered addicts whose injecting behaviour was known reported currently injecting, similar to 2011 where 55% reported currently injecting.
- Of the 226 individuals on the Addicts Index, 10% (23) were registered within the last year, 48% (109) have been registered for between 1 and 5 years, 22% (50) have been registered between 6 and 9 years, and 19% (44) have been registered for 10 years or more.

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#### 1. Introduction

# **Statutory Requirement: Notification of Addicts**

- 1.1 Until March 1997, information about drug addicts in Northern Ireland was included in the UK Addicts Index maintained by the Home Office. However, the emergence of drug misuse databases in Great Britain led the Home Office to discontinue the UK Index and doctors in Great Britain are no longer required to notify cases of addiction to Chief Medical Officers.
- **1.2** This change does not affect Northern Ireland. Doctors here remain under a legal obligation to report cases of addiction.
- 1.3 The Misuse of Drugs (Notification of and Supply to Addicts) (Northern Ireland) Regulations 1973 require any doctor to notify the Chief Medical Officer (CMO) of the Department of Health, Social Services and Public Safety in writing within 7 days, if they attend a patient who he considers to be, or has reasonable grounds to suspect is, addicted to any of the following controlled drugs:

Cocaine

Methadone (Physeptone)

**Dextromoramide (Palfium)** 

**Morphine** 

**Diamorphine (Heroin)** 

**Opium** 

**Dipipanone (Constituent of Diconal)** 

Oxycodone

Hydrocodone

**Pethidine** 

Hydromorphone

Phenazocine

Levorphanol

**Piritramide** 

1.4 Failure to notify within 7 days can result in disciplinary action against the doctor. Although notification does not imply that a prescription for a controlled drug has been, or will be, given by the doctor, where this is the case full details should be supplied.

The following Information must be supplied:

- **1.5** The above regulations require addiction cases to be renotified annually.

#### **Other Information**

1.7 It must be noted that the Addicts Index does not provide information on the overall size and scope of problem drug use in Northern Ireland – as it reports only on those *addicted* to certain notifiable drugs. It does not include information on those known to be using these same drugs – where they are not considered to be addicted. Information on persons with problem drug use presenting to services for treatment is available from the Northern Ireland Drug Misuse Database (DMD). 

Further information on the management of drug misuse is contained in 'Drug Misuse and Dependence – Guidelines on Clinical Management' and in the 'Northern Ireland Protocol for Opiate Detoxification' issued by the Department in 1999.

#### 2. Persons on Index


Figure 1. Number of Registered Addicts in Northern Ireland (1999 - 2012)

**2.1** Figure 1 shows that there were 226 persons registered on the Addicts Index at 31 December 2012, a decrease of 46 from 272 persons registered at 31 December 2011 (Table 1).

2.2 The Belfast Health and Social Care Trust had 102 registered addicts (47%), compared with 60 in the Northern HSCT (27%), 24 in the Southern HSCT (11%), 20 in the South Eastern HSCT (9%) and 13 in the Western HSCT (6%) (Table 1; Figure 2).

Figure 2. Registered Addicts by Health and Social Care Trust





#### Age and Gender

2.3 Just under one quarter of registered addicts were aged 29 years and under at 31 December 2012 (52 registered addicts; 23%). 46% of registered addicts were aged between 30 and 39 years – 49 were aged 30-34 years and 54 were aged 35-39 years. 37 were aged 40-44 years and 34 were aged 45 years and over (Table 2 & 3; Figure 3).

Figure 3. Registered Addicts by Age and Gender




2.4 Figure 3 shows that overall there were more males (172) than females (54) registered on the Addicts Index in 2012 - this was also true within each of the age groups. The gender breakdown broadly mirrors the findings of previous years; with males comprising the majority of all registered addicts since 1999 (Table 4).

### **Notifiable Drug Used**

2.5 Figure 4 shows that over four fifths (83%; 187 individuals) of those registered on the Addicts Index are reported as being addicted to heroin. This is followed by almost one fifth (19%; 44 individuals) reported as being addicted to methadone. Seven per cent (15 individuals) were recorded as being addicted to cocaine (Table 5a).

Figure 4. Notifiable Drug Used




Individuals can be addicted to more than one notifiable drug and thus the percentages will total more than 100.

2.6 Of those registered on the Addicts Index at 31 December 2012, 160 individuals were recorded as being addicted to heroin only; a further 14 were addicted to heroin and methadone and 9 individuals were addicted to heroin and cocaine. Overall, 14% (31 individuals) of all registered addicts were recorded as being addicted to more than one notifiable drug (Table 5b).

#### **Injecting Behaviour**

**2.7** Of the 226 addicts registered at 31 December 2012, the injecting behaviour of 165 was known. Of these, 94 (57%) were known to be currently injecting while 71 (43%) did not inject (Table 6; Figure 5).

Figure 5. Injecting Behaviour



#### **Duration on Addicts Index**


Figure 6. Years Registered on Addicts Index

**2.8** Figure 6 shows that of the 226 individuals on the Addicts Index at 31 December 2012, 10% (23) were registered within the last year, 48% (109) have been registered for between 1 and 5 years, 22% (50) have been registered between 6 and 9 years, and 19% (44) have been registered for 10 years or more.

### 3. New Notifications

**3.1** There were 23 new notifications in 2012, compared with 32 in 2011. Of these, one had previously been registered with the Addicts Index but had been removed. The reason for previous removal was no evidence of ongoing addiction (Figure 7).

#### **Source of New Notifications**

- **3.2** Of the 23 new notifications in 2012, 21 (91%) were notified by Drug Addiction Units, while 2 (9%) were notified by a General Practitioner (Table 7).
- **3.3** The highest number of new addicts were notified from within the Belfast Health and Social Care Trust (12 individuals, 52%), while 6 (26%) were notified from within the Western Health and Social Care Trust


#### Age and Gender

3.4 Of the 23 new addicts registered in 2012, 11 (48%) were aged 29 years and under while 5 (22%) were aged 30-34 years. Males comprised just under two-thirds (65%) of new notifications in 2012 (Tables 9a and 9b).

#### **Notifiable Drug Used**

**3.5** Of the 23 new notifications in 2012, 22 (96%) were addicted to heroin. Five (22%) were addicted to other drugs (Table 10a; Figure 8).

**3.6** Twenty individuals were addicted to heroin only and three were addicted to more than one notifiable drug (Table 10b).

#### **Injecting Behaviour**

**3.7** Of the 23 new addicts registered during 2012, the injecting behaviour of 21 was known. Of these, 18 (86%) were known to inject, whilst 3 (14%) did not inject (Table 11; Figure 9).

Figure 9. New Notifications - Injecting Unknown 9%



## 4. Removals from Addicts Index

**4.1** A total of 56 addicts were removed from the Addicts Index in 2012, compared with 74 addicts removed in 2011 (Table 12; Figure 10).

- 4.2 Table 12 shows that addiction had ceased for approximately two-fifths (41%) of those removed from the Addicts Index in 2012. However, it should be noted that this category also includes those for whom there is no evidence of ongoing addiction. Just over one half (52%) of those removed from the Addicts Index in 2012 were categorised as 'Whereabouts Unknown'. 7% of those removed from the Addicts Index in 2012 had either died or were no longer resident in Northern Ireland .
- 4.3 Just over one third of those removed from the Addicts Index in 2012 were registered with the Belfast Health and Social Care Trust (18 individuals, 34%); followed by the Southern HSCT (16 individuals; 30%) and the Northern HSCT (13 individuals; 25%). Six (11%) of those removed were registered with either the South Eastern HSCT or the Western HSCT (Table 13).

## 5. Comparisons: 2011 to 2012

**5.1** At 31 December 2012, there were 226 registered addicts. This was a 17% decrease from 272 in 2011 (Table 1). There were 203 renotifications in 2012 compared with 240 in

- 2011, while there were 23 new notifications to the Addicts Index in 2012, compared with 32 in 2011 (Table 7). There were 56 cases removed from the Addicts Index in 2012, compared with 74 in 2011 (Table 12).
- 5.2 In 2012, 76% of addicts were male, in comparison with 79% of addicts in 2011 (Table 4). The age profile was similar in 2011 and 2012, with the only notable difference being that in 2012 23% of registered addicts were aged 29 years and under compared with 26% in 2011 (Table 3).
- 5.3 Heroin remains the most frequently reported notifiable drug: reported for 83% of all addicts registered in both 2012 and 2011. Methadone (19% of addicts reporting use in 2012, compared with 18% in 2011) and cocaine (7% of addicts reporting use in both 2011 and 2012) remain the next most commonly reported drugs (Table 5a).
- **5.4** In 2012, over half (57%) of those registered addicts whose injecting behaviour was known reported currently injecting. The corresponding figure for 2012 was 55%. It should also be noted that the injecting behaviour was not known for 27% of registered addicts in 2012, and 28% in 2011 (Table 6).

#### 7. Editorial Notes

- **7.1** This report is based on information received for 2012 up to and including 28 February 2012.
- 7.2 The 2005 figures included in this report have been revised since first published on the  $2^{nd}$  March 2006.
- **7.3** The revised 2005 figures and the 2006-2011 figures in this report represent the total number of addicts registered at the 31<sup>st</sup> December. This is new notifications plus renotifications less any of those who have been

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removed in the same calendar year. In previous years the total number of addicts registered at the 31<sup>st</sup> December has been the total of all new notifications plus re-notifications in that calendar year.

- **7.4** Percentages in tables do not always add to 100 due to rounding.
- **7.5** From 1<sup>st</sup> April 2007, the five new Health and Social Care Trusts were formed by the merging of the existing healthcare trusts. The information in this publication has been presented by the new Trust structure.

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
