



# Northern Ireland Waiting Time Statistics:

Outpatient Waiting Times Quarter Ending June 2016



# **Reader Information**

Purpose:	This statistical release presents information on waiting times for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in Northern Ireland and reports on the performance of the Health and Social Care (HSC) Trusts against the 2016/17 Ministerial waiting time target which states that:
	"By March 2017, 50% of patients should wait no longer than 9 weeks for a first outpatient appointment; with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks."
	This statistical release details information on the number of patients waiting, and length of time waiting, for a first consultant led outpatient appointment in HSC Trusts at 30 <sup>th</sup> June 2016. It also includes activity for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment commissioned by the Health Service during the quarter ending June 2016. Data are presented by HSC Trust, specialty and time band. Information on Integrated Clinical Assessment and Treatment Services (ICATS) waiting times are available in the accompanying CSV file.

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Target audience:	Department of Health (DoH), Chief Executives of the HSC Board and Trusts in Northern Ireland, health care professionals, academics, and Health & Social Care stakeholders, the media and general public.
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
The Ministerial target for outpatient waiting times states that, by March 2017, 50% of patients should wait no longer than 9 weeks for a first outpatient appointment, and no patient should wait longer than 52 weeks.


At 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016, a total of 225,593 people were waiting for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in Northern Ireland, 4.9% (10,442) more than at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2016 (215,151), and 6.2% (13,151) more than at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2015 (212,442) (Table 1).



Almost two fifths (39.6%) of those waiting for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment were in the Belfast HSC Trust, with a further 19.6% waiting in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 16.5% in the Southern HSC Trust, 12.7% in the Western HSC Trust and 11.6% in the Northern HSC Trust (Table 2a).

Nearly two thirds (64.1%, 144,659) of the 225,593 patients waiting for a first outpatient appointment were within the following seven specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery (30,401); Ear, Nose and Throat (28,263); General Surgery (28,205); Ophthalmology (19,784); Gynaecology (14,987); General Medicine (11,904) and Neurology (11,115) (Table 3a).



Achievement of the 9 week target requires that less than 50% of patients should be waiting over 9

At the end of June 2016, 64.8% (146,167) of patients were waiting more than 9 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment, compared with 63.2% (136,036) at the end of March 2016 and 60.8% (129,224) at the end of June 2015 (Table 1).

At 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016, the 9 week element of the target was not achieved by Northern Ireland as a whole or by any individual HSC Trust (Table 2a).

A total of 68.4% (99,942) of the 146,167 patients waiting more than 9 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016 were within the following seven specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery: General Surgery; Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT); Ophthalmology, Neurology; General Medicine and Urology (Table 3a).



At the end of June 2016, over one in ten patients (13.4%, 30,170) of patients were waiting more than 52 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment. This is an increase of 23.3% (5,702) compared with the end of March 2016 (24,468), and almost three times the number waiting at the end of June 2015 (10,143) (Table 1).

At 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016, the 52 week element of the target was not achieved by Northern Ireland as a whole or by any individual HSC Trust (Table 2a).

The proportion of patients waiting longer than 52 weeks at 30<sup>th</sup> June 2016 was 20.7% (18,455) in the Belfast HSC Trust, 13.3% (3,806) in the Western HSC Trust, 9.3% (4,116) in the South Eastern HSC Trust, 7.6% (2,821) in the Southern HSC Trust and 3.7% (972) in the Northern HSC Trust (Table 2a).



A total of 89.5% (26,991) of the 30,170 patients waiting more than 52 weeks for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment were within the following seven specialties: Trauma and Orthopaedic (T&O) Surgery; Urology; Neurology; Ophthalmology; General Medicine; General Surgery and Rheumatology (Table 3a).



During the quarter ending June 2016, there were 127,242 attendances for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment in Health Service hospitals in Northern Ireland, 2.0% (2,529) more than during quarter ending March 2016 (124,713), and 7.2% (8,503) more than during quarter ending June 2015 (118,739) (Table 4).



During the quarter ending June 2016, 1,137 Health Service patients attended a first outpatient appointment within the Independent Sector. This is a significant decrease on the quarter ending March 2016 (23,763) but an increase on the same quarter in the previous year (251) (Table 4).

When the number of attendances commissioned by the Health Service, within the Independent Sector, during the quarter ending June 2016 (1,137) is combined with that for outpatients attending a first outpatient appointment in Health Service hospitals during the same period (127,242), it is estimated that approximately 128,379 outpatients attended a first appointment in Northern Ireland for an assessment commissioned by the Health Service (Table 4). This was a decrease of 13.5% (20,097) on the number seen during the quarter ending March 2016 (148,476), and 7.9% more (9,389) than during the quarter ending June 2015 (118,990).

# **Appendix 2: Explanatory Notes**

- 1. The source for the data contained in this release is the DoH CH3, QOAR and IS1 Part 1 Returns. These returns collect information from Health and Social Care Trusts on a quarterly basis.
- The 'Outpatient Waiting Times Publication Supporting Documentation' booklet details the technical guidance, definitions, as well as notes on how to use the date contained within this statistical release. - 3. All of the data contained in the tables are available on a quarterly basis and can be supplied by individual specialty or Provider HSC Trust if this level of detail is required. In addition, quarterly data relating to waiting times for a first consultant-led outpatient appointment have been published in spreadsheet format (CSV), split by HSC Trust, Specialty and Programme of Care, in order to aid secondary analysis. - 4. Information includes patients living outside Northern Ireland and privately funded patients waiting for treatment in Health Service hospitals in Northern Ireland.
- 5. Outpatient waiters are defined as patients still waiting for their first outpatient appointment at the end of the quarter, including those who have cancelled or missed a previous appointment. An outpatient appointment is to enable a patient to see a consultant, a member of their team or locum for such a member, in respect of one referral. Waiting time for a first outpatient appointment begins on the date the HSC Trust receives a referral for a first outpatient appointment and ends on the date a patient attends a first outpatient appointment. Patients who cannot attend (CNA) have their waiting time adjusted to commence on the date they informed the HSC Trust they could not attend, while patients who do not attend (DNA) have their waiting time adjusted to commence on the date of their DNA.
- 6. From 1<sup>st</sup> April 2014, Oral Surgery services undertaken by consultants contracted to the South Eastern HSC Trust were centralized, meaning that records for patients waiting for this service in both the Northern and Southern HSC Trusts are now held and managed in the South Eastern HSC Trust. - 7. Each outpatient waiting timeband relates to the number of completed weeks a patient has been waiting for outpatient assessment. For example, a patient waiting exactly 6 weeks would be included in the 0-6 week timeband and a patient waiting 6 weeks and 1 day would be included in the >6-9 (greater than 6 weeks but waiting no longer than 9 weeks) timeband.
- 8. The Ministerial target, for outpatient waiting times, as set out in the Health and Social Care (Commissioning Plan) Direction states that by March 2017, 50% of patients should wait no longer than nine weeks for a first outpatient appointment, with no patient waiting longer than 52 weeks.
- 9. Revised figures for the Northern HSC Trust for the end of March 2016 have been received and included within this publication.
- 10. The total number of completed outpatient waits each quarter, within HSC hospitals, is derived as the total number of attendances at a first outpatient appointment from the Departmental Quarterly Outpatient Activity Return (QOAR).
- 11. The number of patients that received an outpatient assessment, commissioned by the Health Service, in the Independent Sector is collected on the IS1 Part 2. These figures are provided by

the HSC Board. They are published for each transferring Health and Social Care Trust (Trust responsible for the patient's waiting time). They are not National Statistics and they have not been validated by the Department, however, they have been included to provide users with a comprehensive view of completed outpatient waits during each quarter.

- 12. HIB surveyed data providers during 2011/12 to ascertain the cost of producing, validating and submitting the information required for this publication. This relates to the time taken to generate, validate and submit data, over and above what is already required by their organisation for internal performance management purposes. The cost to data providers of compliance within HIB's requirements for this publication, based on HSC salary costs, was £3,110.
- 13. Figures relating to outpatient waiting times for the quarter ending 30<sup>th</sup> September 2016 will be released on Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> November 2016.
